## General Advice Regarding IHRE Internship Placements

---

On behalf of all of us at IHRE, we are pleased that you have decided to participate in the internship program. We know your internship experience will be both challenging and inspiring. As an IHRE intern you will spend 10-12 hour per week in a substantive internship with a local NGO in Johannesburg while also taking a semester-long IHRE course called *Engagement with Human Rights*. Our IHRE internship hosts -- 29 of Johannesburg's leading human rights -- recognize that IHRE students offer meaningful contributions to their work and our mentors look forward to working with you.

This internship guide is designed to provide you with the basic information you need to determine whether a particular internship host is a good fit for your needs, interests, and skills. In this guide you will find:

**Mission & Activities:** A broad overview of the organization's mission and core activities. We encourage you to consider the organization's mission closely and to make sure it is well-aligned with your interests. It is important to choose your internship preferences based on this issues and ideas you are most passionate about. This is what will keep you motivated to overcome challenges you experience along the way.

**Internship Details:** Information provided by our NGO hosts regarding the details of each internship. This includes any job description, areas of expertise and/or skills sought by the organization, and/or a general idea of what kinds of tasks might be expected of the intern.

One of the first things that you may notice as you read through this guide is that a number of the organizations have not provided detailed job descriptions. *Keep in mind that this is not necessarily a bad thing!* Sometimes organizations simply cannot plan so far in advance what their specific needs will be at the time you start your internship. In other cases, organizations may want to wait to know who you are before assigning specific tasks, matching your qualifications and interests to available tasks and projects. In other cases, organizations will look to you to help identify tasks and projects and will be grateful if you are pro-active and take initiative in this regard. One of the first things that IHRE interns will do is to sit down with their mentor on their first day and craft a job description to guide their work during the semester.

**Previous Student Projects:** A brief description of what previous IHRE students have done in their internships. While your experience will likely be quite different, this information can be very helpful to you in determining whether an organization is the right fit for your skills and interest.

**Working Environment/Location:** Information on the day-to-day working environment at the NGO. Overall, we encourage students to be very flexible and open-minded about their internships. However, there may be certain circumstances that would make your internship experience less enjoyable for you. For example, if you would be very unhappy to sit in an office all day and would rather be working "in the field" with people we recommend that you pick an internship that meets this need. If you are a person you needs a lot of structure some of our internship placements might be too unstructured for you. Please make sure to take the working environment into account when selecting your internship preferences! ## IHRE Internship Host Organizations

<b>Action Support Centre</b>	
<b>Mission &amp; Activities</b>	<p>The ACTION Support Centre was initially established in 2002 on the basis of a mandate to set up a communications hub for the network members of ACTION global. It has since transformed itself into a regional and continental base for organizations working in the fields of conflict and development. Through a focus on mobilization, building organizations, advocacy, facilitating training and initiating innovative forms of capacity building it has built a strong network movement that amplifies the voices of communities and links them to policy makers at different levels. <b>Internship Details</b>	No formal job description is currently available. Students will have the opportunity to help facilitate workshops so facilitation skills or the willingness to learn how to facilitate workshops is highly desirable.
<b>Previous Student Projects</b>	<p>Previous interns have worked on policy formation and capacity-building projects, conducted research on xenophobia, and updated the website. <b>Working Environment / Location</b>	<p>ASC is a small, informal and intimate organization working at the grassroots but connected to a global network of projects. The organization works with limited resources so interns may need to work on their own laptop. This internship will be a good fit for a hard worker who “does not have expectations of saving the world.” Students should expect to spend the majority of their time doing office-based work. There may be some opportunity for travel to attend workshops. Students should be prepared to be very pro-active and comfortable working without a lot of structure.</p> <p>This internship is a safe walking distance from Wits.</p>

# AIDS Consortium

<b>Mission &amp; Activities</b>	<p>The AIDS Consortium was established in 1992 by Justice Edward Cameron, today a judge of the Supreme Court of Appeal, and other HIV/AIDS activists. Its objective is to promote a non-discriminatory response to HIV/AIDS based on people’s basic human rights as enshrined in the South African constitution. The AC is a network organization primarily concerned with servicing people infected and affected by HIV/AIDS through its affiliate constituencies. By providing communication, capacity, information, collective services, leadership and guidance to its affiliates, they are able to shape the response to HIV/AIDS in various communities. The AIDS Consortium is a human rights organization committed to openness and non-discrimination on the basis of HIV/AIDS.</p>
<b>Internship Details</b>	<p>Interns placed at the Aids Consortium will likely work on the following types of tasks</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>○ Workshops on basic HIV/AIDS, treatment literacy, monitoring and evaluation</li> <li>○ Information and resource program, Cyber Café, advocacy and networking</li> <li>○ Website and newsletter development</li> </ul> <p>They have not yet identified a specific project that students will work on this year but interns will definitely assist with the organization’s “Heroes Campaign.”</p>
<b>Previous Student Projects</b>	<p>Previous student projects have included organizing a dialogue on the Wits campus regarding the legalisation of sex workers in Johannesburg and South Africa as well as creating an informational brochure on tuberculosis.</p>
<b>Working Environment / Location</b>	<p>Students should expect to spend the majority of their time doing office-based work.</p> <p>This internship is a safe walking distance from Wits.</p>

## Anti-Privatisation Forum

<b>Mission &amp; Activities</b>	<p>A social movement established in 2000 to organise and unite struggles against all forms of privatisation in the workplace and community, the Anti-Privatisation Forum (APF) links workers' struggles for a living wage with community struggles for housing, water, electricity, etc. It provides a forum to share experiences, strategize collectively and conduct community workshops. With over 20 different community affiliates, it works in several provinces around the country. The APF produces research reports, pamphlets and posters and engages with the mainstream media.</p>
<b>Internship Details</b>	<p>IHRE students interning at APF will mainly be involved media work. The intern will help with research for the production of the APF newsletter, coordinate and liaise with APF affiliates for contributions regarding their events and campaigns, write a few opinion pieces on APF or affiliate activities, and generally help produce/distribute the newsletter.</p> <p>Some work on the APF website would be included. The APF also has video footage of various campaigns and would be keen to have someone with the technical skills to produce small documentary clips from this footage (not essential, however!)</p>
<b>Previous Student Projects</b>	<p>Previous students worked with the media team, updating the website and media contact database and assisting with production of <i>"The Struggle Continues"</i> newsletter. She reported and wrote for the latter and also participated in campaigns with APF affiliates. (Her work is on their website).</p>
<b>Working Environment / Location</b>	<p>Since the APF is <u>not</u> a research NGO, it operates within a very informal and flexible environment with limited human and financial resources. Students wishing to intern here must be resourceful self-starters who take the initiative to work independently and without constant mentorship.</p> <p>This internship is not within walking distance. Students must arrange their own transportation to the internship site.</p>

## Black Sash

<b>Mission &amp; Activities</b>	<p>The Black Sash is an independent, non-governmental human rights organisation that has worked tirelessly for justice and equality in South Africa for nearly 55 years. Their vision is making human rights real. Since the end of apartheid in 1994, the Black Sash has focused on the promotion and protection of hard-won freedoms, particularly in the areas of social and economic rights. Black Sash’s mission is to work toward a South Africa in which:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Human rights are recognised in law and respected in practice;</li> <li>• The government is accountable to ALL its people and attends to their basic needs in a participatory and dignified manner;</li> <li>• The Constitution is upheld by all;</li> <li>• Social and economic justice is recognised as fundamentally important; and</li> <li>• ALL members of society take responsibility for reducing inequality and extreme poverty.</li> </ul> <p>The Black Sash provides <u>free</u> advice and paralegal support, <u>free</u> rights education to enable vulnerable people to access their social and economic rights, and advocates for legislation and policy that promotes social and consumer protection for vulnerable people in South Africa.</p>
<b>Internship Details</b>	<p>No formal job description is currently available.</p>
<b>Previous Student Projects</b>	<p>This is a new internship host organization for IHRE so no additional information is available.</p>
<b>Working Environment / Location</b>	<p>The Black Sash office is a provincial office (their headquarters are in Cape Town) so they are a small office manager by a small team. They are a well-resourced organisation.</p> <p>This internship is not within walking distance. Students must arrange their own transportation to the internship site.</p>

## Central Methodist Church / Albert Street School

<b>Mission &amp; Activities</b>	The Central Methodist Church is situated in Central Johannesburg and is home to over 2,000 refugees from Zimbabwe. The Albert Street School is an informal school established to provide some form of schooling to the children refugees. It caters to over 80 children ranging from the age of 5 years to 22 years old. Most of the children attending the school are boys, the girls seem to find work in the informal sector, domestic workers and some are even forced into prostitution.
<b>Internship Details</b>	No formal internship description is currently available. Please see previous student projects for an idea of what kind of projects interns may work on.
<b>Previous Student Projects</b>	<p>Previous students have worked on the following projects:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Organizing life skills workshops for the different classes, creating a platform for the children to share their life stories and be educated in different life skills ranging from HIV/AIDS prevention, combating peer pressure, healthy relationships, and suicide prevention.</li> <li>• Recording Zimbabwean refugees' accounts of their lives in Zimbabwe and their attempts to relocate to South Africa.</li> </ul>
<b>Working Environment / Location</b>	<p>This is a very hands-on internship with a lot of opportunity to work directly with refugee children and youth. Students must be prepared to undertake significant responsibility and leadership in planning and organizing activities for this internship. However, students should be aware that this internship will likely be quite challenging due to working with people who have fled difficult conditions and who are presently living in a very dire circumstances.</p> <p>The IHRE internship coordinator will also serve as a mentor for students placed in this internship. Students must arrange their own transportation to the internship site and may be escorted by the IHRE internship coordinator.</p> <p><u>Given the particular challenges of the working environment for this particular internship any interested student must contact IHRE for a mandatory advising session prior to selecting and being placed in this internship.</u></p>

## Children of Fire

<b>Mission &amp; Activities</b>	Children of Fire aims to help young survivors of burn injuries in Africa and to help and educate the communities in which they live, providing both prevention and cure. More specifically, Children of Fire is working with children who were burned by rebels in the Democratic Republic of Congo; children who have survived <i>kwashiorkor</i> (an acute form of childhood protein-energy malnutrition) and severe burns in Zimbabwe; those suffering human rights abuses in squatter camps; fire-and-injury prevention work; burn survivor surgery and rehabilitation; a surgical outreach program to Kinshasa; provision of unique medical prosthetic courses for Tunisian surgeons; rural upliftment with the Amangwane nation; and more.
<b>Internship Details</b>	No formal job description is available but there is an outline on possible research projects available for students interested in interning at Children of Fire. Please request an outline from IHRE if you are interested in an internship at Children of Fire.
<b>Previous Student Projects</b>	This is a new internship host organization.
<b>Working Environment / Location</b>	<p>Children of Fire office is situated on the premises of the children's home which means interns will have contact with the children most of burn victims. This organization is severely understaffed and students interested in interning there should prepare themselves for very hands- on internship. Although there will be a specific project for individual interns to work on, students are expected to get involved in all projects of the organization.</p> <p>The organization is not within walking distance of campus. Students must arrange their own transportation to the internship site.</p> <p><u>Given the particular challenges of the working environment for this particular internship any interested student must contact IHRE for a mandatory advising session prior to being placed in this internship.</u></p>

## Civil Society Watch/CIVICUS

<b>Mission &amp; Activities</b>	<p>CIVICUS: World Alliance for Citizen Participation is an international alliance of an estimated 100,000 members in about 100 countries that has worked for over a decade to strengthen, citizen action and civil society throughout the world, especially in areas where participatory democracy and citizen's freedom of association are threatened. CIVICUS has a vision of a global community of active, engaged citizens committed to the creation of a more just and equitable world. Their three main objectives are civic existence, civic expression, and civic engagement.</p> <p>CIVICUS core programmes include:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>○ Civil Society Index</li> <li>○ Civil Society Networks</li> <li>○ Civil Society Watch</li> <li>○ Knowledge Development &amp; Dissemination</li> <li>○ Legitimacy, Transparency and Accountability</li> <li>○ Strengthening Participatory Governance</li> <li>○ CIVICUS World Assembly</li> <li>○ Millennium Development Goals (MDGS)/Global Call to Action against Poverty (GCAP).</li> </ul>
<b>Internship Details</b>	<p>Tasks will include monitoring and communications, such as:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Monitoring threats to civil society in a variety of countries and providing written updates for newsletters and website;</li> <li>• Researching and writing articles on issues related to freedoms of association, assembly and expression; and</li> <li>• Researching media contacts in selected countries.</li> </ul> <p>The main objective and preferred outcome from the interns' work is enhanced coverage of threats to civil society in the media. Strong communications skills in English (other languages are an advantage), and a background in media, politics, international relations, human rights or related fields are desirable.</p>
<b>Previous Student Projects</b>	<p>Students have previously work on compiling a compendium of international legal instruments related to freedom of association, assisting with the Pan African Solidarity campaign on Zimbabwe, and developing the programmatic monthly bulletin.</p>
<b>Working Environment / Location</b>	<p>This is a very research-based internship. Students should be prepared to spend the majority of their time working in an office-based environment.</p> <p>CIVICUS is within walking distance of Wits but we do not advise students to walk there. Students must arrange their own transportation to the internship site.</p>

## Edge Institute

<b>Mission &amp; Activities</b>	<p>The Edge Institute is an economic policy centre in Johannesburg that does research to promote sustainable growth, development and distributional equity. The Edge Institute provides in-depth analysis of the macro-economy and of industrial sectors, focusing on long-run trends and strengths and weaknesses in South Africa and other African countries. Through reports and publications, seminars and workshops, the Institute engages in debate about policy alternatives for South Africa's economic and social development. EDGE Institute research provides essential information for the analysis of business risk, including market risk and risks emerging from the socio-political and regional environment. The EDGE Institute research promotes four broad themes: 1) private sector development; 2) win-win links between equity and growth; 3) managed engagement with globalization; and 4) South Africa's role in Africa.</p>
<b>Internship Details</b>	<p>No formal job description is currently available. See information available from previous student projects. Per the specific request of the host organization, interns <u>must</u> be an economics major.</p>
<b>Previous Student Projects</b>	<p>Students previously participated in the following activities:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>○ Information gathering and processing: The Edge Institute runs a database on foreign investment and other economic issues which requires daily monitoring of the media, via internet, to extract relevant article and information.</li> <li>○ Downloading economic statistics and processing these to create charts and tables</li> <li>○ Web-design</li> </ul>
<b>Working Environment / Location</b>	<p>Students in this internship should be prepared to spend the majority of their time working in an office-based environment.</p> <p>This internship is a safe walking distance from Wits.</p>

## Forced Migration Studies Programme (FMSP)

<b>Mission &amp; Activities</b>	<p>Since its foundation in 1998, it has become a key reference point for academics, service providers, and policy makers. Its staff and associates conduct innovative, empirically grounded research and training on migration and humanitarianism in the African context together with select post-graduate students from across the continent and beyond. Supported by the University's extensive libraries and other resources, the programme provides critical research skills while contextualizing theoretical debates on migration, displacement, and humanitarianism in Africa. The programme's teaching is designed for students and practitioners seeking greater insight into the causes and consequences of migration in Africa from a global perspective. It provides an introduction for those new to the field and opportunity for reflection for those with practical experience. Based in Johannesburg – the heart of southern Africa's politics, culture, and economy – the FMSP's teaching and research staff includes scholars from diverse geographic and disciplinary backgrounds.</p>
<b>Internship Details</b>	<p>No formal job description is currently available. Please see information on previous student projects for further information.</p>

## Freedom of Expression Institute (FXI)

<b>Mission &amp; Activities</b>	<p>The Freedom of Expression Institute (FXI) was established in 1994 to protect and foster the rights to freedom of expression and access to information, and to oppose censorship. The Institute was formed from a merger of three organisations: Campaign for Open Media, Anti-Censorship Action Group and Media Defence Trust.</p> <p>The FXI undertakes a wide range of activities in support of these objectives, including lobbying, education, monitoring, research, publicity and litigation and the funding of legal cases that advance these rights. In the process, it networks with, and collaborates with, a wide range of organisations locally and internationally.</p>
<b>Internship Details</b>	<p>The FXI will host one intern in the law clinic. Students must be studying law or have an interest in studying law.</p> <p>The purpose of the FXI Law Clinic is to promote the objectives of freedom of expression and access to information through providing legal services for litigation and precedent setting cases in relation to freedom of expression. The Law Clinic aims to support applicants whose cases will contribute to a freer environment for freedom of expression and elimination of censorship. The Law Clinic provides FXI and its various programmes with general legal advice-broadly render legal services. Specifically:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>○ Provides expert legal advice and opinion on freedom of expression matters (free speech, media freedom, access to information)</li> <li>○ On referral by the various programme heads, gives legal advice to clients of FXI</li> <li>○ If need be, undertake litigation on behalf of FXI and/or its clients</li> </ul>
<b>Previous Student Projects</b>	<p>No specific information available as no intern has recently been placed with FXI.</p>

## Gay and Lesbian Memory in Action (GALA)

<b>Mission</b>	<p>The advancement, development and rights of LGBTI people depend on an accurate record and representation of their struggles. Gay and Lesbian Memory in Action (GALA) mobilises memory by documenting and popularizing the lives and histories of LGBTI South Africans. In so doing it contributes to the development of pride, challenges homophobia and entrenches the rights of LGBTI people.</p> <p>GALA was established under the name The Gay and Lesbian Archives in 1997, one year after the adoption of South Africa's new Constitution and its sexual orientation clause. In the words of the archives founder Graeme Reid, "It was a time to look back and recognize that something momentous had taken place. South Africa had set a precedent, and the records of how we did it seemed worth preserving." In order to raise public awareness and to fulfill its role as a community archive, GALA has implemented an outreach strategy that uses theatre and film productions as well as an innovative tour called "Queer Johannesburg," along with more traditional outreach methods such as exhibits.</p>
<b>Internship Details</b>	<p>No formal job description is currently available.</p>
<b>Previous Student Projects</b>	<p>No specific information is available as this is a new internship.</p>
<b>Working Environment / Location</b>	<p>Internships at GALA are very interactive and students interning there will be able to participate in most of their projects.</p> <p>Gala's office is located on the Wits campus.</p>

## Habitat for Humanity

<b>Mission</b>	Habitat for Humanity South Africa is a non-profit, non-governmental Christian housing organization dedicated to the elimination of poverty housing in South Africa and committed to making decent shelter a matter of conscience and action. Habitat for Humanity SA has over the past three years, developed a Special Needs Housing Programme to specifically address the desperate housing needs of caregivers taking care of orphans in rural and semi urban communities.
<b>Internship Details</b>	Interns will be part of a new project, which focuses on the growing need for housing of refugees living in South African and the consequences of the lack thereof.
<b>Previous Student Projects</b>	No specific information is available as no IHRE students have yet been placed in this internship.

Through this lies a form of empowerment that has seen many writers and vendors use the paper to save money, start their own businesses and/or move on to working with other mainstream publications. Homeless Talk continues to open doors for new aspiring writers from the street, offering training and increasing their resource database through research.</p>

## Khulumani Support Group

<b>Mission &amp; Activities</b>	<p>The Khulumani (“speaking out” in Zulu) Support Group was formed in 1995 by survivors and families of victims of political conflict during apartheid. Set up in response to the pending Truth and Reconciliation Commission (TRC) to enhance people’s access to TRC processes, Khulumani is a membership organization (with over 54 000 individual members) that continues to reach and support survivors of apartheid-era violations.</p> <p>Core functions include lobbying and advocacy for outstanding TRC issues (e.g. prosecution of those who failed to apply for amnesty); and the documentation of success stories. Khulumani has collected approximately 30,000 cases in their “<i>Creating Community</i>” project which geographically maps human rights violations across South Africa. Other focus areas include: gender, reparations, international and national lawsuits, training and skills advancement. Khulumani prepares biographies of people who disappeared. They assist in overcoming wrongful criminal records, developing exhumation policies for the disappeared, working up cases for possible prosecution, and compensation for loss of homes through forced displacement.</p>
<b>Internship Details</b>	<p>One project will include working on a comparative research project analyzing how two different Latin American countries (probably Argentina and Chile) have dealt with trying to end impunity in the 10-15 year period since their truth commission processes.</p> <p>Secondly, students will work with 2 cases from around Gauteng. Each intern would need to work up a case as if we were taking it to court for prosecution. Khulumani will then organize a mock trial with 2 different local member groups to help demystify the court processes of prosecution and to create a learning opportunity about what prosecution might look like. This would set the tone for beginning processes of community tribunals as potential vehicles for truth discovery.</p>

<p><b>Mission &amp; Activities</b></p>	<p>ProBono.Org facilitates <b>free legal services</b> for the poor from volunteer private attorneys and advocates. ProBono.Org does so by establishing links and building bridges between the private legal sector and the public interest legal needs of the poor. Our role is to <b>match-make</b> our clients with the most suitable volunteers from the legal profession. ProBono.Org does the matchmaking in a number of ways.</p> <p>The primary one is our <b>General Clearinghouse</b>. Daily staff attorneys and interns consult with people off the streets and from NGO referrals, and matters with merit are referred to our panel of over 40 law firms and 800 advocates as a pro bono request. We also manage <b>free legal clinics</b> in three specialist legal areas: a <b>Refugee Legal Clinic</b> where refugees and asylum seekers can access advice; an <b>HIV/AIDS Legal Clinic</b> where HIV positive people can obtain legal assistance; and a <b>Family Law Clinic</b> that serves people with family related legal problems. These legal clinics are held once a week and are staffed by attorneys from various law firms.</p> <p>We run a <b>Hospice Wills Project</b> which holds information sessions at various hospices in Greater Johannesburg on the role of wills in making arrangements for children. Different law firms participate in project, and their attorneys <b>draft wills</b> for patients on request.</p> <p>We also constantly keep a look-out for issues which are in the <b>public interest</b> and where <b>litigation</b> may assist. We research and prepare high impact public interest cases that private sector attorneys are willing to take on.</p>

## Steve Biko Foundation

Biko's approach emphasized the importance of the connection between identity, agency and change. It focused on the inextricable link between the individual and society, between history and biography. Through this link the individual internalizes influences from their society that come to determine his or her role in the community. In turn, the individual plays out their life in a way that contributes to the history of that society.</p> <p>The Foundation recognizes that since 1994, South Africa has done well in setting policies for development, defining clear targets in relation to the tangible aspects of development such as houses, water and electricity. The next few decades present the challenge of delivery. The delivery phase requires the active participation of not just government but all South Africans. Agency is, however, a function of a peoples' sense of identity. A people with a sense of who they are, and a sense of common purpose, are better able to imagine who they can become.</p> <p>The vision of the Biko Foundation is to be the premier independent promoter of the values that Steve Biko lived and died for: restoring people to their true humanity. ## Street Law Project

<b>Mission &amp; Activities</b>	Street Law is practical, participatory education about law, democracy, and human rights. It is a service-learning program that connects university students with prisons, schools, and youth organizations through workshops on democracy and human rights. Originally designed at Georgetown University Law Center in Washington, DC, Street Law was aimed at training law students to teach high school students and others about their legal rights and where they might obtain legal assistance. In essence, the program explains to people “on the street” how the law affects them in their daily lives. Street Law also encourages people to think critically about the legal system and to consider alternative forms of dispute resolution such as mediation, arbitration, and negotiation when dealing with conflict.
<b>Internship Details</b>	No formal job description is currently available. This internship is suitable for law students or student studying law. This internship may also be of particular interest to students who are interested in learning more on how education is an important tool for raising awareness regarding human rights.
<b>Previous Student Projects</b>	Previous IHRE interns helped design and conduct training at schools and prisons and also sat in on some street law lectures and seminars. One intern spent his mid-semester break on a Street Law Project in a rural area of the country.
<b>Working Environment / Location</b>	Students will be working with the Wits campus chapter of the Street Law organization whose headquarters are situated elsewhere in South Africa. The mentor travels often but stays in regular communication with the students regarding their projects.  This internship is located on the Wits campus.

## Tshwaranang Legal Centre (TLAC)

<b>Mission &amp; Activities</b>	TLAC was established in 1996 to use the law as a tool for social change for women who were survivors of gender-based violence. Initially, TLAC confined its work to education and training and legal advocacy. In 2005, TLAC expanded its work to include a legal services unit and a research and policy unit. In 2007, they took another step and opened a second office in Mpumalanga. This office provides legal services to abused women and survivors of rape and gender-based violence and women's health issues in order to identify gaps and opportunities for strengthening a multi-sectoral response to gender-based violence.
<b>Internship Details</b>	No formal job description is currently available.

They provide training and facilitate content dissemination and creation that supports women, girls, and women's and gender organisations and networks to take control of their own content and ICT use.</p> <p>Launched in March in 1998 as a joint initiative of South African Non-Governmental Organization Network (SANGONET) and the Commission on Gender Equality (CGE), Women's Net works to advance the gender equality and justice in South Africa through the use of Information and Communication Technologies (ICTs) by providing training and facilitating content dissemination and creation that supports women, girls, and gender organizations and networks to take control of their own content and ICTs used. Recognizing that ICTs are a gendered tool, Women's Net seeks to address imbalances in the access and meaningful used of ICTs through research and advocacy for gender aware ICT programmes and policies at all levels of society. Women's Net builds women's organizational capacity to use technology strategically to find the people, resources, tools and content they need to social action.</p>
<p><b>Internship Details</b></p>	<p>No job description is currently available. In general, students can expect to research articles, and facilitate workshops.</p>
